HOW DO YOU GET INVOLVED?

This is a permanent registration number and will allow your dog to compete in events that are non-breed specific events.

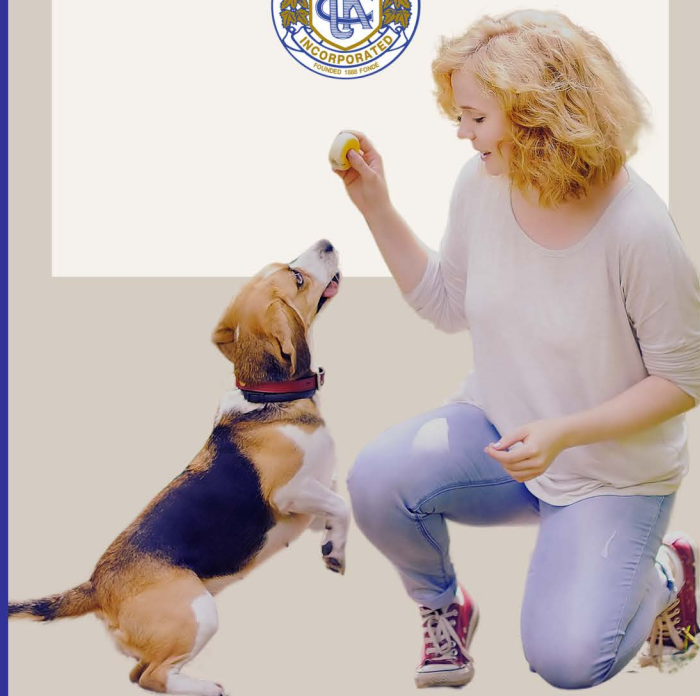
GET STARTED WITH TRAINING

The journey to competing with your dog begins with finding the right training class. Ask your veterinary practice for local recommendations.

Don't hesitate to ask the training facility about its training philosophy, class structure, and methods used. It is often helpful to observe a class without your dog first, giving you a clear sense of the environment before signing up.

YOU AND YOUR DOG ARE A TEAM

Every dog will benefit from an introductory obedience class, which is a great first step toward earning a Canine Good Neighbour (CGN) title. From there, you might explore further obedience training or dive into exciting activities like rally, agility, and many other dog sports. Just as people have their preferences, so do dogs—and so, with a wide range of options to choose from, there's sure to be one that's a perfect fit for you and your dog!



BE A CANINE GOOD NEIGHBOUR

The Canine Good Neighbour (CGN) program is an excellent starting point to building essential skills and manners, making your dog a well-behaved companion and competition-ready! While the CGN test itself is not a competition, it will assess the handler and dog's relationship, plus the handler's ability to control the dog in a variety of situations. With test components ranging from accepting a friendly stranger, holding a stay, to calmly passing an unknown dog, the CGN demonstrates that the dog and handler have a solid relationship.
